

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

In May of 1995, the Gloucester Museum of the Gloucester Historical Society is planning an exhibit of the Hawthorne area, from 1830 to the expropriation of the 1950's.

We would like to have the participation of the families who have lived in Hawthorne in the 30s and earlier, to show the present generation what home life was like at that time.

Written articles are really the best items, as they portray people's views on everyday occurrences, and tell it exactly as it was at that time.

Pictures of the area would also be excellent, as the landscape has changed completely since the '30s, when herds of cows headed for the barns along what is now the Walkley Road, and horses were used to transport not only bags of grain and machinery, but also people, travelling to and from the city.

We would welcome any information you have pertaining to family, the Hawthorne area, the school, teachers and neighbours. After all, it is the families who make the place interesting, and it is the family histories that will keep your grandchildren and great-grandchildren interested in visiting museums and archives in the coming years, with their children. They will be interested too, in reading articles written by an Aunt, Uncle, or Sister of someone they know, so put your name on it and become a part of their family story.


The opening of the exhibit "Kreative Kitchens -1930" was attended by approximately 80 people and has been visited by a number of people in May and June.

The "Hawthorne" exhibit is in the preparation stages and Ruth Lafortune will be compiling all the historical information that comes in during the summer.

Bill Mellon has been investigating the possibilities of an exhibit on The Armed Services LETE (LAND ENGINEERING TEST ESTABLISHMENT). It is destined to close this summer and has been part of Gloucester for 50 years.

Ten collections of 190 artifacts have been registered this year. Thanks to the wonderful assistance of Barbara Sigridson the artifacts are part of the collection. There are many more donations that have yet to be accessioned.

Thanks to the thoughtfulness of many donors there are some interesting new dishes, glassware, documents, cameras, clothing etc.....

Loans of artifacts have been made to Billings Bridge Estate Museum of two artifacts — the bathtub and the small wooden bed. They are being used in an exhibit "From Head to Foot" which is a very interesting history of beds used at the Billings house. This exhibit was prepared by Museum Tech. students under the direction of Sheila Rorke Exhibit Coordinator for Billings and a member of the Gloucester Museum Board. Well worth a visit!

We have loaned a few small items to Cumberland Museum which will be used in an exhibit on packaging. The Pinhey's Point Museum is borrowing three of the school desks and three inkwells for their summer exhibit on schools of the 1920's. The Gloucester Museum will be recognised in the exhibit labels. This is an excellent way for the museum to be publicized locally.

CYRVILLE

So far as is known the Cyrville area was called "Delorme" up to the 1850's and for the most part was forest. Cyrville is in the north west section of Gloucester Township (now the City of Gloucester), Carelton County. The land was fertile and suitable for growing vegetables. The fact that Bytown (later Ottawa) was only about three miles away would help the settlers as it provided a ready made marketplace for their produce.


Mr. Louis Cyr and his brother Michael were pioneer settlers who came from France. Michael Cyr bought all 200 acres of Lot 27, Concession 2, Gloucester Township, from John Forgie in 1853 according to the entry in the Carleton Registry Office. In the early 1860's the Cyr brothers sold some of their land to settlers with names such as Parisien, Guilbert, Triole, Plante, Carriere, Parent, Brule, and Laviolette.

In the 1860's the name of the community was changes to "Cyrville". A church and school were needed, and on February 25, 1967 the Parish of Cyrville was formed. The Cyrville Notre de Lourdes Church was ready for use by 1872, and fully completed by 1882.

In 1898 the Ottawa - Montreal Railway (later known as the Canadian Pacific Railway), was completed and ran south of the village. In 1909 the Grand Trunk Railway was built through the village, this line ran almost parelled to the Ottawa River. In 1907 property had been bought for the Cyrville Station. Later the Canadian National Railway and New York Central Railways were built south of the village.

Electric power lines were extended to the Cyrville area in 1928 when 30 families put electricity in their homes.

On June 7, 1933 about 11 a.m. a severe hail storm hit the area, breaking windows, and driving garden plants into the ground. Although it lasted only five minutes the damage caused was enormous, and the gardners had to set out new plants all over again.

Re: The wooden bicycle (see front cover).

Built in 1898 by 17-year-old James Blair who lived in Gloucester on the now site of Ritchie Feed & Seed store off Innes Road. He would often ride it all over the farm and enjoyed the attention when taking it to the Byward Market in Ottawa. Bystanders were amazed at the ingenious assembly of bits and pieces into a useful means of transportation made almost entirely of wood.


