### President's Report

I would like to thank all the members of our Board of Directors who so easily replaced me at the last minute for our annual general meeting. No one is indispensable, a message I have now received first hand. The meeting was well attended, in part due to our speaker, Ben Stafford, who gave us such a vivid description of his childhood community, Hurdman's Bridge. Flo Ladds also brought in many people from the Overbrook community who were interested in this local heritage.

At the meeting all of our Board members agreed to stay on for another year, and Ed Kirk agreed to join us. Board membership now stands at 11, with one position vacant.

What I have been able to do since our AGM was find out more about how the Gloucester Museum is functioning and what is happening at the City concerning museums. If you take out your copy of our Fall 2002 newsletter you will see a museum report. This is mainly good news, showing how the museum staff have made a lot of improvements, and fixed some old problems. This is still happening, but we are concerned that there is no longer a staff member on-site full-time. And no new exhibits have been produced in the past two years.

We have met with a consultant, Catherine Cole, hired by the City to study the situation of all 10 museums in the City and to make recommendations. Her report will be available to the City in about one month. She will probably be recommending that each museum have it's own curator. This sounds good in principle, but all indications are that money will become scarcer in the coming year. As a result and anticipating further deterioration of the situation of the Museum, your Board have decided to become more actively involved in the affairs of the Gloucester Museum. We will be reporting our findings and possible directions in the next newsletter and at our October event.

Please mark your calendars for Sunday, October 19 at 2 P.M. This event will give us an opportunity to exchange the latest information about the Society and the Museum. I am sure you will enjoy our speakers, and the opportunity to tell your own stories, if you wish. You will find the ad for this event further on in this newsletter.




